Grammar Tips

◆ Adding *SÔ* after an adjective allows you to talk about what you think or guess, after you look at or listen to something.

◆ When you add *SÔ* to I-adjectives, you change I at the end to *SÔ*.

I-adjectives : OMOSHIROI (interesting) \Rightarrow OMOSHIROSÔ (seem interesting)

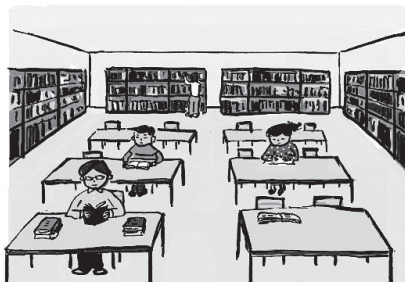
NA-adjectives : HIMA (free) \Rightarrow HIMASÔ (seem to be free)

◆ You can say this to decline a proposal, in a soft, indirect way, without directly voicing disapproval.
e.g.) HORÂ WA CHOTTO.... (Horror stories are a little bit....)
