Kono doraiyaa wa i<sup>1</sup>kura de<sup>1</sup>su ka.

How much is this hair dryer?

When asking how much something costs, say "ikura desu ka" or "how much is it?" When you mention the name of the thing, ask "Kono/Sono/Ano [thing] wa ikura desu ka." "Ikura" is an interrogative meaning "how much?"

# Japanese Bills and Coins

Japan has four kinds of paper money: 1,000-, 2,000-, 5,000-, and 10,000ven bills. But you rarely see 2.000-ven bills around.

## Japanese bills









As for coins, there are 6 types: one yen, five, ten, 50, 100, and 500. People have plenty of opportunity to use them, with vending machines on almost every corner. But the machines don't take one-ven or fiveyen coins. So, they stay in your pocket until you shop at a store.
