Key Phrase

お風呂は何時から何時までですか。

Ofu'ro wa na'n-ji kara na'n-ji ma'de de'su ka.

From what time to what time can we use the bath?

To ask from what time something is going to start and what time it will end, use “nan-ji” or “what time” and say “nan-ji kara nan-ji made desu ka.” Clarify the question by starting with the subject plus the particle “wa.” “Kara” means “from” and “made” means “until/to.”

Use It!

すみません。明日の朝食は何時から何時までですか。

Sumimase'n. Ashita no chooshoku wa na'n-ji kara na'n-ji ma'de de'su ka.

6時から9時半までになります。

Roku'ji kara ku-ji-ha'n ma'de ni narima'su.

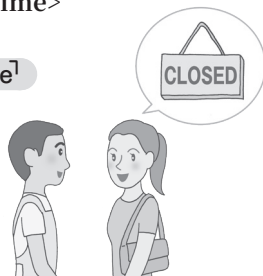

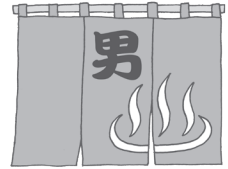
Bathing in a Hot Spring

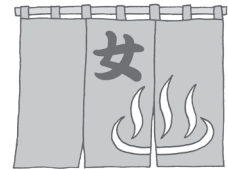
